

## ENSURE COMPREHENSIVE, HIGH QUALITY EDUCATION FOR ALL STUDENTS

Our children deserve an education that prepares them for college, careers, and civic leadership.

**Universal Early Education and Childcare** – All children should have the chance to get a head start through universal affordable, high-quality early education. This includes increasing access to community-based and on-site workplace child care.

**High-Quality Schools** – To ensure that all children receive a high-quality education, regardless of their residence or educational background, we must guarantee that educational quality is consistent across all Boston Public Schools.

**Vocational Pathways** – In order to make good-paying jobs more accessible, we need to create more direct pipelines to opportunities in the trades and other industries that do not require a four-year degree.

**School Safety Surveys** – To ensure the safety of our children, the City should work with BPS and other local schools to expand the BPS Climate Survey and make results publicly accessible.

**BPS Budget Transparency –** The City should have complete transparency around how funds are allocated and how programs are evaluated in the Boston Public Schools. BPS should have multi-year budgets that give school leaders and teachers more predictability in planning programs.

**BPS Principal Pipelines –** We need to ensure that we are preparing teachers to take on positions as leaders, especially in turnaround schools.

**Healthy, Tasty School Lunches –** We want to ensure that all Boston Public Schools receive healthy, fresh, and locally sourced food for school lunches that taste good and include culturally diverse cuisines.

**Social and Emotional Supports –** All students in the Boston Public Schools should have access to a well-staffed support team of nurses and guidance counselors.

**Arts Education** – To enable every child in the city to receive a well-rounded education, the City should partner with local nonprofits and cultural institutions to implement robust arts and culture programming in the Boston Public Schools.
